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Message From Mrs Reilly...

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

I can't believe the year is coming to an end. It's been fantastic, exciting, exhausting, fun-filled and I've learnt so much. It's this time of the year that you reflect on what you wanted to achieve and what you actually have achieved. It's a time to plan for next year and set new goals.

Some of the achievements for 2018:

Learning: There has been so much learning in the school. Both teachers and students have been given opportunities to extend their understandings, learn new things and raise their personal expectations. Evidence of this being achieved is an improvement in student learning, teacher practice, PAT-R results and Early Years Assessment results.

Behaviour: Clear expectations have been put in place to ensure a safe, friendly, caring school environment. Students know about being safe, respectful learners and this mantra is being mirrored in the playground and when they are on excursions. Our counsellor has been working with classroom teachers to build students' skills to deal with tricky situations. Evidence of this being achieved is significantly less "hands on" incidents and lots more positive and engaging play amongst the students.

School environment: The new Kindergarten space is nearly complete and the Stage 2 refurbishment will commence early next year. Shade cloth and fence replacement as well as other basketball hoops, a blackboard and toys for the playground have been purchased.

Community building: We have welcomed you into the school grounds and have encouraged improved communication between the school and families. Successful events like the movie night, bingo / games night as well as special celebrations like Grandparents' Day have been a real highlight of the year. The Year 4 Writers' Festival showed me how important it is for your child to share their learning. Kindergarten transition was another success as parents were able to share their learning with their children.

Communication: Facebook has become a vehicle to share what is happening at the school. We have been adding lots of photos, information and children's work for you to enjoy.

New goals for 2018:

Continue to improve the gains made as above through:

- •More opportunities for parent learning about what their children are doing
- •Use of Facebook and the school webpage to provide instructional videos for parents
- Open classrooms for each stage group each term
- Liturgies for parents to share the children's learning at the end of each unit of work
- •New furniture for some of the spaces
- Painting of the Administration building
- Landscaping of gardens
- Additional air conditioners for the MPA
- Additional equipment for the playground
- Launch of PBS4L
- •Additional whole school celebrations
- Creation of a school song

Thank you for all the support you have given to myself and the staff this year. I am looking forward to an exciting 2018 with lots of new learning and successes. Have a happy and safe Christmas and a relaxing holiday break.

St Joseph's is in the process of changing to a new phone system. The new school phone number is **4726 4200**. The new school fax number is 4726 4299.

There will be 18 months of staged redirections and messages for calls to the 'old' school phone number.

For the first 6 months calls to the old number will be automatically redirected to the new number.

For the second set of 6 months, the call will be automatically redirected after a brief message that the number has changed.

For the last 6 months, callers to the old number get a recorded message that states the new number but then hangs up, so the caller has to manually dial the new number themselves.

Attendance Update



At St Joseph's we are aiming for over 90% total school attendance. Unfortunately we ended the year at 78.1% attendance. Congratulations to Year 2 who have finished the year on 92.4%!

We encourage children to be at school and on time every school day. However, if your child is sick please keep them at home.

If your child is sick and away from school for 3 or more consecutive days a doctor's certificate is required on their return.

Twilight Swimming Carnival 2018

Now that our Swim School Program has begun we are looking forward to hosting our upcoming swimming carnival early next year. The carnival will be held:

Tuesday February 6th 2018 commencing at 4:30pm at Ripples St Mary's

All children who have turned or will turn eight years old or over in 2018 from grades 2-6 (2018) are welcome to enter.

All children attending the carnival will need to be accompanied by a parent or guardian, no child will be permitted to swim without their parent/guardian present.

The following events will be scheduled:

- 100m Freestyle (8-12+ years, the students must be confident, competent swimmers who have attempted 100m swims prior to the carnival).
- 50m Age Freestyle (8,9,10,11,12+)
- 50m Breaststroke (Junior Event 8,9,10 years) 11 Years Event, Senior Event (12+ Years)
- 50m Backstroke (Junior Event 8,9,10 years) 11 Years Event, Senior Event (12+ Years)
- 50m Butterfly (Junior Event 8,9,10 years) 11 Years Event, Senior Event (12+ Years)
- 200mIM (8-12+ years, the students must be confident, competent swimmers who have attempted 100m swims prior to the carnival).

This Twilight Carnival is a **competitors only** meet. There will be no 25m or novelty events. The fastest two boys and girls in each event may be selected to represent St Joseph's at the Nepean Zone Carnival in Glenbrook. The Zone qualifying times set by PDSSSC will be considered in selecting school representatives as well as the ability to swim the stroke correctly.
